





As Spiritual Director of Catholic Street Missionaries, I'm very happy to offer my endorsement to its New Hope on the Horizon program. This in-depth experience of outreach to the homeless can have a transformative impact on young people. It fosters spiritual growth, inspires compassionate service and development of meaningful connections with those on the street in Vancouver.

Horizon on the Horizon emphasizes CSM's unique ministry, building genuine relationships with those experiencing homelessness. Participants will be encouraged to step out of their 'comfort zone' and engage authentically with individual people who are homeless.

They start with a 'hello' and offer practical assistance such as food, drink and warm clothing, followed by some friendly conversation and when it is appropriate, they offer spiritual support through prayer. This approach fosters a sense of connection belonging and hope among those they encounter.

This program offers much more than CSM's regular weekly outreach. Hope on the Horizon missionaries will dive deeper into building trusting relationships with friends on the street by visiting them four times a week.

For two-and-a-half weeks participants will live a communal life— praying, learning and serving together. Participants will be reinvigorated with the renewed passion for serving others. They will also develop invaluable skills in communication, empathy and leadership that will serve them well in all areas of their future life. What's more – they will cultivate a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ — discovering the joy and fulfillment comes from following his example of selfless love.

I wholeheartedly recommend Hope on the Horizon to any young person wants to spread their love of Jesus to the poor and marginalized in Vancouver.

Building **COMMUNITY** Before Service

THE FOUNDATION OF FAITH AND HEALING

Walking in faith is not a solitary journey; it is a path meant to be shared. When we prepare for street ministry, especially when ministering to the homeless and vulnerable, the need to build a strong, supportive community becomes essential. The work of serving those on the streets isn't just about addressing material needs but offering spiritual and emotional care. To do that effectively, we must first cultivate our own hearts, heal from our past, and foster deep connections with others who walk the same path of faith.

Community-building before embarking on street ministry provides a strong foundation for this work. It allows individuals to be supported, uplifted, and encouraged by like-minded believers. It's within this shared environment that faith can flourish, accountability can take root, and spiritual growth can thrive. These

relationships become a source of strength, especially when facing the challenges and emotional weight that street ministry often brings.

Part of preparing our hearts for this journey involves taking time for personal healing, reflection, and deepening our connection to God. Silent retreats, such as the 3-day hybrid retreat at Carmel Hill in Deroche, offer the perfect opportunity for this. These retreats are spaces where individuals can step away from the noise of everyday life, focus on their spiritual journey, and allow God to heal old wounds, including childhood traumas that may have held them back.

Silent retreats provide an environment where introspection and prayer can lead to transformative healing, allowing individuals to enter street ministry with open, compassionate hearts.

Living in community during these retreats and beyond fosters vulnerability, support, and love—elements that are crucial when ministering to others. Before stepping onto the streets to serve, it's vital to experience this kind of healing and support within a safe, faith-filled community. As individuals come together in shared faith and healing, they are better equipped to bring love, hope, and spiritual guidance to those they will serve.

Building community, embracing healing, and deepening faith aren't just preliminary steps; they are the essence of what will sustain and guide those called to minister to the homeless. In this shared journey of faith, we find the strength and grace to offer love, compassion, and hope to those most in need. And it is in healing ourselves that we are best able to help heal the world around us.



Ray also spoke to the young men about vocations. After the retreat at Carmel Hill ended, one young man was so moved that he immediately emailed the Vocation Director in his home diocese. He shared with us his thoughts, saying, "When I imagine myself on my wedding day, I feel happy. But when I imagine my ordination day, I am overwhelmed with joy, and brought to tears."

CSM SUMMER OUTREACH

The **Hope on the Horizon Summer Outreach Program** offers a remarkable opportunity for young Catholics aged 19 to 30 to respond to Christ's call to serve the homeless with compassion. Coordinated by the **Archdiocese of Vancouver** in partnership with **Catholic Street Missionaries**, this transformative program will take place in the **summer of 2025**.

Participants will experience **a rich community life**, grounded in the power of **prayer**, while deepening their understanding of **Catholic teachings**. They will actively serve the homeless on the streets of Vancouver, engaging in a **holistic formation that nurtures their human, apostolic, spiritual, and intellectual development**. Throughout the program, participants will receive training and leadership guidance from experienced Street Ministry leaders, who will offer invaluable insights and support as they embark on this mission of service.

In addition to their outreach work, participants will enjoy moments of **joy through recreational activities** and be provided with accommodations that foster a supportive and nurturing environment. **The program is open to all young Catholics, regardless of prior experience**, and is designed to equip participants with the skills and knowledge necessary to fully engage in the mission of serving the homeless with love and compassion.
